Celebrating an October 17 occasion of her birth in Montello, Wisconsin (Wi - sconsin) is our quilter of the quarter, **SUE CAMPBELL**. Montello is about 55 miles northeast of Madison, the state capital.

"I have six older brothers, and then me, the baby girl, who obviously was spoiled all her life. Graduated from Montello High and along life's path took numerous college courses, mostly dealing with accounting and credit.

I have one fabulous son who added to the spoiling I always enjoyed from his uncles.

Moved to California in 1993 to work as a Credit Manager and continued to work in Credit and Collections until I retired.

Learned to sew on a Singer treadle machine when I was eight. My mother had me do things like making pot holders out of scraps with old toweling as the batting. I did hems on flour sack dish wipers. She taught me to embroider but couldn't teach me to knit or crochet because I'm left-handed. A classmate taught me to knit and I taught myself to crochet. My mother could only crochet from figuring out someone else's finished product but eventually I taught her to crochet from directions.

After four years of Home Ec in High School, was surprised to discover that my teacher was "of all things" one of my father's old girl friends who had never married. I don't know whether I got A's because of that fact or whether I was just a good student. I do remember that our Senior project for our final grade was a LINED business suit. Mine was green gabardine and I wore it for my first job interview (I got the job).

I have made garments for several close friends, but didn't enjoy it as much as sewing my own clothes, so I didn't do a lot of it.

My favorite type of quilt to make is machine appliqué. What fun to create creatures and/or Sunbonnet Sues using all the small pieces in my stash - - 99% trunk fabric. I'm proud to produce small quilts for Project Linus without a trip to the fabric store. I treat selection like a mystery, finding the right colors and fabric right

from my <u>own</u> fabric store (stash).

When I'm not sewing (when is that?) I read, read, read and once in awhile I vacuum. I'm trying to read all the suspense and murder mysteries in the library that are written by women. I like their take on life and can identify with it.

I'm also a Sweet Adeline (women's barbershop harmony organization) and absolutely love learning new music and performing with my chorus.

The best thing I ever made for myself was an outfit for my son's wedding. He told me exactly what he wanted and I produced it, color, style and fabric just as requested. I was working full-time then and had a 5-week deadline. Finding the fabric in a small town in Wisconsin was the challenge. The sewing was a snap.

The best quilt I ever made is the last one I made, and hopefully the next one I make."

- In Sacramento, CA. "I my paper today, there were some numbers and "fun facts" listed and I thought you all would like to know two of them: 53,000,000 is the number of American women who know how to knit or crochet, a 51% increase from 10 years ago. And 255 is the number of stitches knitted in 3 minutes by a Scottish woman to set the world knitting speed record."
- ▶ From a Fox Valley, WI coordinator: "Last week I picked up 40 blankets made by a group of middle school students in our area. They were encouraged to write notes and attach them to their blankets. The teacher didn't have time to read the notes, so as I sewed on labels, I read the notes. A lot of them wrote comforting messages, "Roses are red, violets are blue, we made this quilt especially for you." It was a good thing I decided to read the notes because one of them written by three boys who had worked together on a quilt read "We made this quilt for you, Please appreciate it. It took us hours." That note was removed!
- ▶ From Lisa (a Tarzana mother) "I just wanted to say that my son is hospitalized in the Pediatric ICU. He was given a quilt from your organization and I just wanted to say Thank You Very Much. It is so wonderful to know that you are taking time to do wonderful and beautiful things for sick kids. Thank you again from the bottom of my heart."
