As we prepare for our next National Make a Blanket Day on February 17, 2007, we're lucky that once again Tim Brown of KING-DOM SEWING is sponsoring a drawing for a new Janome sewing machine at both his Northridge and Simi Valley Stores. Just make a quilt (and for this event it does need to be a quilt . . . pieced and quilted by you), put a Linus label on it and take it to one of his stores and you'll have a chance to win for every quilt you submit . . . Beginning November 1st and continuing through February 16. The drawing will be held on NMABD February 17, 2007. Your quilt will be received by the chapter within 2 weeks of your donation . . . It will not be held until February. You must drop off your quilt in person. Hint: if you make several quilts, take address labels with you to save some time and effort writing out information . . you'll just need to add phone and email for the record.

Project Linus

Project Linus has a two-fold mission:

- First it is our mission to provide love, a sense of security, warmth and comfort to children who are seriously ill, traumatized or otherwise in need with gifts of new, handmade blankets and afghans, lovingly created by volunteer "Blanketeers."
- Second, it is our mission to provide a funfilled, rewarding service opportunity for interested individuals and groups in local communities, for the benefit of children.

PROJECT LINUS has more than 340 chapters representing all of the United States and as a result of the combined efforts of these dedicated "Blanketeers," almost 2,000,000 blankets have been donated to children in crisis since its formation in December of 1995.

Handmade Hugs is a totally volunteer organization dedicated to comforting kids with security blankets. Handmade Hugs is a local chapter of PROJECT LINUS



COORDINATOR Suz tells us that in six years, Handmade Hugs has distributed over 11,000 blankets to more than 20 local hospitals and agencies.

DID YOU KNOW... That there is a new tool for blanket makers who don't want knots in their fleece? It's a special blade for your rotary cutter (you can see a cutter with this blade in the lower left hand corner of the picture at left) that will make it easier for you to crochet edgings around fleece blankets. This "skip-stitch" rotary blade does away with marking and piercing the fleece with awl or ice pick, and

makes crocheting beautiful borders like the ones at left and below so much easier. The beautiful blankets shown here were made by **Lenore Strong**.

. . the white one is particularly lovely with its lacing of pink ribbon. There is a Leisure Arts booklet "Baby's Choice Crocheting Edgings for Fleece" with instructions for six different edgings. Suzann has information regarding ordering this blade.

From "Quilt Connections:" "When I need accurate copies of a pattern, I go to my local blue-printing shop where the copy machines have no distortions . . . especially good for paper piecing."

"PROJECT LINUS delivers an average of 939 blankets per day, 365 days a year. That means that about 39 blankets are delivered every hour of the day, or about 1 every 1.5 minutes."

Did you spill coffee on one of your projects? Get the stain out by making a paste of baking soda and water and rubbing on the stain. Rinse and dry.

Bread is delivered to the grocery store 5 days a week . . . each day has a different color twist tie or keeper: Monday is blue, Tuesday is green, Thursday is red, Friday is white and Saturday is yellow.

SOMEBODY we don't get to see very often but who does a very important job for Handmade Hugs and Project Linus is **NAN MAPLES**. Nan takes all the "orphan" blocks brought to her and makes them into beautiful little blankets for the "Angel Babies." These blankets, though diminunative in size, offer comfort and dignity to the families of these tiny heaven-bound babies. The



coverlets are a good way to use fabric remnants and pieces of batting that aren't big enough for the larger Linus quilts. They are sized from 12 inches by 15 inches to 20 inches by 24 inches. Why not make some yourself or bring your left-over blocks to Nan?

HABITS & PREFERENCES

(Lenore Strong passed out a questionnaire when 30 of Handmade Hugs Hearties were retreating in Buellton. Some answers she's received:)

BLANKETEER CAROL THILLE is a triple talent who sews, knits and crochets. She learned to sew at age 10, to knit a year later, and when she was 23 learned to crochet at Sears.

CAROL is always on the lookout for bright kid-friendly prints. If she doesn't have something specific in mind, she'll buy 2 yards.

CAROL's favorite quilting tools: a wooden drafting board larger than a cutting mat to give the mat stability when she cuts on it. A mouse bad with wrist support pad to keep her machine foot control in place. She puts the control on the mouse pad with the wrist rest on the far end, away from her.

CAROL's favorite batting is Warm and Natural.

CAROL will sometimes tie quilts with pearl cotton or crochet thread. For crocheted blankets, she likes to make a Granny Ripple pattern with Red Heart yarn.


CAROL bought a 6-foot-long folding table for sandwiching quilts. She has it raised to save her back and uses binder clips (buy them at office supply stores) to hold the fabric and backing together.

CAROL loves the anniversary outings and thinks that Suzann McGinnis is a fantastic coordinator. She also likes the good fellowship.

Will you meet the challenge?

Use this fabric in a pattern of your choice or if you didn't get the fabric (a bolt only goes so far, you know) sew, knit or crochet something with a dash or two <u>or</u> a whole lot of brilliant yellow. Your answer to this challenge is sure to be charming.



ODDS & ENDS . . . An editorial thanks to Lenore Strong for her contributions to this issue of Handmade Hugs.

Don't forget that most of us have honorary memberships in S.A.B.L.E. . . . Stash Accumulated Beyond Life Expectancy. No pearls involved.

Marcia Hohn's QUILTER'S CACHE website continues to amuse and amaze. She comes out with easy directions for traditional blocks (along with names) and very creatively drafts her own designs. It's a site you can visit every day and always learn something and never get tired.

Starch isn't just for shirts . . . buy a quart or two-quart bottle of liquid starch and an empty

spray bottle. Mix one part liquid starch with four parts water in the spray bottle and you have an easily controlled way to starch cut out pieces before you sew them . . . great for triangles and curved edges.

A bar of oil-free soap (Ivory?) placed on a small dish makes a great pincushion. The pin points benefit from the soap's lubrication making pinning fabric easier and more precise.

Do keep your sewing machine covered when it's not in use. You'll save time (who wants to dust the machine?) and possibly repair costs.

If you've a lead foot on your machine pedal, consider keeping your glasses on while you're sewing. A needle broken at high machine speed can fly just about anywhere.

QUILT ... It's good for you!!
